Course Description:

This course is the second of four theory/skills courses offered as part of the music program. Its principal focus is music theory and completes the discussion of diatonic harmony begun in Music 270. The course introduces chromatic harmony, tonicizations, binary and classical form, and tonal counterpoint. Further development of musicianship skills (singing and dictation) and keyboard skills continues.

Intended Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Compose original melodies and harmonies and decorate melodies following the styles of the baroque and classical music eras.
- 2. Perform melodies and harmonies in video performances
- 3. Analyze baroque and classical music using scale degrees, figured bass, melodic figures, roman numerals, tonicization arrows and prolongation brackets.
- 4. Recognize and create diatonic sequences.
- 5. Harmonize and realize a tonal melody in two to four parts from a given soprano or a given bass using proper voice leading and proper phrase structures for baroque and classical music.

This course will make use of a WATERLOO LEARN website as well as external websites. The LEARN site will provide all information and links to external resources required to complete the course. As this is a weird term where we will be starting ONLINE and hopefully returning to in-class learning, you will not be

able to complete this course without access to the LEARN site. You will not be able to see the full modules when you begin the course, as materials will be released weekly. You can see the overall course schedule below, which shows the topics, related chapters, assignments and due dates. This will give you a general overview of the course. This same material is also on LEARN in the weekly modules for the course, with directions, videos, links to each assignment (on LEARN and on external sites) and due dates.

NOTE: When we are meeting ONLINE, we will be meeting via ZOOM at the same time as class will generally be. However, when we are meeting online, I will keep the formal part of the class short and will record my screen for this part of the class. Then I will stop the recording and allow students to leave or stay for more practice. This is an opportunity for you to have extra practice and have a dedicated time in which you can ask me questions! Music 271 is the hardest Music Theory course in the series, and there are many concepts that require regular practice and deep thinking.

Course Requirements:

Because this is a WEIRD term, that will begin ONLINE and hopefully move to fully in-person, I have decided to have all materials available online and there will be a blending of online submission of assignments and in-person possibilities (but these can also switch to online if needed!) So to at least keep some things predictable, I have set-up a regular schedule, so you know when assignments are due regardless of whether it completed online or in-person. Theory Work A (TWA) - These are complete end-of-chapter assignments for chapters 14, 16, 19 & 21. (There is also a KRITIK practice assignment in week 1 that is a participation grade and will be recorded in the Online Practice category.) You will submit these assignments to KRITIK in PDF and mp3 formats. Kritik is an online peer evaluations tool that for which you will be required to register. A Rubric for grading and evaluating is provided in KRITIK. Then you will be required to evaluate four of your peers work using a rubric and written evaluation. Finally you will give feedback on the evaluations given to you. This will require you to better learn the rules of Western Art Music theory counterpoint and harmony and will inform your own work as you move through the course. These are due on Mondays at 11:59pm.

Theory Work B (TWB) – These are smaller partial chapter assignments, analysis as well as some complete end-of-chapter assignments for chapters 12, 14, 15, 16, 17, 19, 20 and 22. You will submit these assignments to the appropriate LEARN dropbox in PDF and sometimes mp3 formats. These are due on Mondays at 11:59pm. **The lowest grades in this category will be dropped.**

Textbook ONLINE Quizzes (TBOQ) are due on Wednesdays before the in-person class (11:30am). I will not be lecturing the textbook material as we have limited in-class time. I expect you to have read the chapter (or section) AND completed the online test BEFORE the class. During the Wednesday class we will be applying the material you learned in the reading to small in-class assignments (generally analysis exercises.) **The lowest grade in this category will be dropped.**

Online Practice Exercises (OP) are due every Friday at 11:59pm. These assignments are on Artusi Music, an online program on which you are required to register. There is one set of practice exercises per week (called *Problem Sets* on Artusi) and will include practice for TWA and TWB assignments along with practice for the weekly Quiz dictations. These assignments help you develop the skills you need to learn the language of music. Regular practice is vital for fluidity in reading and performing music. For each online assignment you will receive immediate feedback so you can keep working on the areas that need improvement and more practice. These assignments are not graded in detail, rather you will receive full credit for getting to 60% in this online program. My hope is that you will try all the different the exercise and then work through the areas in which you need to practice. Everyone is different and may need to practice different things. (TWO will be dropped)

Online Quiz Dictations (QD) are an important aspect of developing your musical skills. These quizzes are found on Artusi Music (Artusi Quiz) and are due on Wednesdays at 11:59pm. You can practice on Artusi in the previous weeks' problem sets. There are 5 weekly Quiz-Dictation worth 1% each (one will drop) and a **Midterm** and **Final** Quiz-Dictation, each worth 2% each

Performance Assignments (PA) are performance assignments and are an important practical part of your learning in this course and are worth 9%. You will be required to either perform for Dr Sunabacka (in-class or privately) Or submit a videos through BONGO. These performances are short and ask you to complete a few tasks individually or in a group that demonstrate the ways you are engaging and performing the newly learned course materials. For the weekly videos you will receive a total of 5%. There will also be a **Midterm** (2%) and **Final** (2%). The materials you prepare for the midterm and final performance will have been practiced in the weekly performances and is essentially the culmination of the work during the first half (midterm) and then the second half (final) of the course. More information will be given in a video about the first video assignment during week 1.

The **Final** for this course will be in two parts. The first part is the **Final Project** where you will write a completed Minuet composed for String Quartet that incorporates all that you learned over the semester. More details will be given in the final module of the course. The second part is the **Final Exam**,

which will be available through the LEARN Quiz tool and will be open for a week during the exam period. Once you begin, you will only have two hours in which to complete the exam. More details will be given in the final module.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS will not be accepted, as it is important to keep up with the work. However, I will give each student ONE WEEK over the course of the term in which a late assignment will be accepted. Please email Dr Sunabacka when you need an assignment extended. But also note that in most categories at least one assignment will be dropped. Use your late days wisely.
